


TIGERS' TALES

On 31 August 2025, Malaya and Borneo Veterans Day, the Australian Government held a National Commemorative Ceremony in Canberra to mark the 75th Anniversary of Australian service in the Malayan Emergency. The initial contribution in 1950 came from the RAAF. It was not until 1955 that ground forces were committed.

The ceremony's handsome Order Of Service booklet can be downloaded from the DVA website. Strangely, its history section mentions only B Troop, 105th Battery deploying to Malaya in 1955, even though it subsequently includes a photo of an A Troop gun firing at night.

70th ANNIVERSARY - MALAYA



When a British Commonwealth Far East Strategic Reserve (FESR) was established in Malaya in 1955, its Infantry Brigade Group included an Australian infantry battalion and a RAA field battery. The battery assembled as 'M' (for Malaya) Battery at Georges Heights in April of that year, and three months later was officially raised as 105th Field Battery.

On 6 October, the Battery under Major Bruce Bogle set sail for Malaya on the White Star liner *MV Georgic*, shown below.



On board the BC kept everyone busy with courses, PT, lessons in Malay, and lectures on Anti-Terrorist Operations in Malaya (ATOM). Two-up schools, crown and anchor and poker were banned, or at least driven below decks.

On arrival at Penang the Battery proceeded to Butterworth where members lived in tents while the *Basha* Huts (concrete floors and walls and roofs of woven coconut fronds) of Quebec Lines,

grew up around them. Married members lived in the Garden Estate, Tanjong Token between Georgetown and Penang.

The Battery consisted of a headquarters; two Troops each of a CP, four 25-pounders; and administrative elements. The CPs (picture below) produced gun data using firing tables and the artillery board to determine bearing and range.



The guns all had gun rules on which the reader for each charge could be set to the gun's muzzle velocity, producing an adjusted elevation to achieve the range ordered by the CP. Meteorological data was sometimes available, but tended to be unreliable.

Training commenced on 7 November 1965, but because the Battery had to await Australian approval to join the action against communist terrorists (CT), operational deployments did not begin until 1 January 1956.

A Troop deployed initially to Salak North in Perak State to support the Malay 1st Federation Infantry Brigade. B Troop deployed to the Dublin rubber plantation in Kedah State in support of 2RAR. At 1900hrs, from B Troop, the BC fired the first operational round of the tour.

The Battery's deployments are shown on Page 13. It was common for firing to take place away from the base locations at temporary troop or roving gun positions, occupied for anything from 12 hours to one or two days.

Throughout the tour the Troops operated independently, the exceptions being during calibration at Port Dickson in January 1956, during Chinese New Year the next month when both Troops were at Bongsu Forest Reserve in South Kedah, and in late June 1956 when B Troop

deployed a Section to reinforce A Troop in support of a significant contact

The Gunners' basic task was to place harassing fire on suspected CT locations by day and night. Local government security committees advised the Troop Commanders of the areas to be engaged.



Waiting For Action

Each Troop maintained local defence measures, assisted with local security measures, and conducted patrols. Dhoby (washing) and char (tea-making) wallahs, mainly Indian gentlemen, were attached. British rations were issued, and the scale allowed for tins of 50 cigarettes.

In addition to gunnery commitments the Battery was tasked with periodic internal security duties and the provision of a ready reaction element. On these activities, Battery members worked alongside Malay police, and occasionally came into contact with local inhabitants

Married men were granted four days stand down per month. Recreational leave was taken twice per year. Favourite leave destinations were Singapore, Johore and Penang

Local leave was taken whenever time permitted.

Tiger Beer was a popular drop. While B Troop had its own unofficial mascot - 'Digger' the pig - it was the Tiger label that ultimately inspired the Battery emblem.

Both troops returned to Butterworth for rest and retraining during December 1956. They acquitted themselves well during the Brigade

Commander's annual inspection, and ended the year with a swimming carnival, children's Christmas party, and a unit dinner.

Each Troop worked in a similar fashion to the year before, sometimes with air OP support. Both operated at some stage close to Malay-Thai border, in B Troop's case working alongside Malaysian 5.5-inch and 3.7inch gun regiments.



Harassing Fire

In addition to commemorations of Anzac Day in both years, ceremonial occasions marked the Battery's tour. The most prominent was A Troop's 101-gun salute to mark Malaya's independence from British rule (Merdeka Day) on 31 August 1957, claimed to be the first salute of this size fired by an RAA battery.



Merdeka Day Salute

A salute was fired on 31 October 1956 for the Duke of Edinburgh, who was en-route to open the Olympic Games in Melbourne. A 27-man guard was mounted for Remembrance Day 1956, during which one gun fired a single round at the start and another at the finish of the two minutes' silence. And a 21-gun salute marked Queen's Birthday on 13 June 1957.

Perhaps the most dangerous incident in the two years occurred on 28 September 1956 when a round in the barrel of a B Troop gun exploded prematurely in the bore. Thankfully, he six men wounded all recovered



Damage From Premature

Sickness and tropical diseases took their temporary toll during the tour, but the only death

was that of Bombardier D K Sutton who was killed in a civilian car accident. He was buried with full military honours in the Taiping Cemetery.



A Troop was withdrawn from operations in early August 1957 and B Troop joined them in Butterworth in mid September. In firing more than 88,000 rounds during its tour, the Battery had made a significant contribution to the Emergency by driving CT into corridors where they were vulnerable to ambush by the supported infantry.



Observed Mission

As the Battery prepared to sail for home on 19 October 1957, the Brigade Commander thanked it for the 'rapid and flexible support [it had] always given', and described it as the best administered unit in the brigade group. The Australian Army Commander FARELF called it 'the best Australian unit in FARELF'. Major Bogle received a Mention in Despatches for his most professional service, and WO2 F A Pellatt and WO2 P H B Pritchard received CinC FARELF Certificates for their meritorious endeavours.


Note 1

Operation Shark North aimed at destroying communist influence in the Kuala Kangsar and Upper Perak districts. Operation Deuce was a search and security operation in Kedah. Operation Rubberlegs. was a search mission in the Kuala Kangsar/Kinta districts. Operation Eagle Swoop was a specific search mission. Framework operations aimed at isolating guerrillas from their support base. Seagull Wax was probably a codename used by the 1st Loyals for a specific activity.

On 29 April 1965, Australia committed the 1RAR Battalion Group for service in South Vietnam under command of Headquarters Australian Army Force Vietnam, and under operational control of 173rd (US) Airborne Brigade at Bien Hoa. 161 Field Battery RNZA (four L5 Howitzers) provided the artillery support.

When the Army considered expanding the force, CO 4th Field Regiment was tasked to prepare a battery. He chose 105th Battery, the then priority light-scaled sub-unit. Strengthened with personnel from across the regiment, the Battery exercised in the Amberley-Flinders Peak area and underwent a week of helicopter moves and live firing at Tin Can Bay. Its commitment to Vietnam was officially confirmed after return to Wacol on 19 August 1965.

The Battery, less an advance party, departed from Brisbane aboard HMAS *Sydney* on 14 September 1965



Landing craft ferried the Battery ashore at Vung Tau on 28 September, from whence it was flown by C130 to Bien Hoa.

With an Australian and New Zealand battery in location, commanders decided that the Tigers would be in general support of American forces, but might alternate in direct support of 1RAR on airmobile deployments.

The organisation of the Battery during the tour is illustrated by the wiring diagram above. The HQ, Gun Troop, observers and LO were linked by a communications net using AN-PRC 25 radios. Sufficient additional personnel were provided to constitute a small pool of reinforcements.

On 30 September 105th Battery began occupying its allocated perimeter position, to be known as Perak Barracks, surrounding the guns and ammunition bays with sandbag bunds, and excavating weapon pits.



The Battery Guide, WO2 Jesse James, a Korean veteran, supervised the construction a complex and much-admired, barbed wire entanglement, and the Battery manned two machine-gun pits for local defence.

Personnel were accommodated in tents. Over time a Battery Office, Q Store, kitchens and messes were established, along with a canteen dispensing dry goods and beer at two cans per man per day when not on operations



On 2 October 1965, at 1135 hours, Sergeant Don McDonald's Alpha Gun formally fired the initial Australian artillery round in the war. Two day's later, the first operational shoot was a landing zone preparation for 1st Battalion, 503rd US Infantry Regiment. Eight days later 80 members of the Battery marched through Saigon in a 'Welcome to Vietnam' parade .

The CP produced firing data using the newly-introduced Plotter Fire Control and associated firing tables and instruments. It used the engagement of known (datum) point to determine the meteorological effect when 'met' telegrams were unavailable.



As the guns had not been fully calibrated before arrival in country, early attempts were made

to redress this situation, or at least ensure MVs were adjusted so that rounds from individual guns fell together. Gun rules at each gun, such as those carried below, converted the range ordered by the CP to elevation according to the gun's muzzle velocity (MV).



By 16 October the Battery had fired 1000 rounds, and a week later it undertook its first operational deployment, flying by Iroquois to Ben Cat, 50 km north-west of Saigon to support 1RAR in the Iron Triangle.



Subsequently, as shown on page 18, the Battery took part in nine search and destroy operations whilst with the Airborne Brigade. The only non-operational deployment was a trip to Phan Rang in November 1965 to commence affiliation with the 1st Brigade, 101st Airborne Division, which the Battery would be supporting on a subsequent operation. While there the Tigers demonstrated an air move, and conducted direct and calibration firings.



Armed with the 105mm L5 Pack Howitzer, the battery was equipped for air mobility. A number of its deployments were made in this fashion.



But half the time it moved by road



On the majority of operations, the Battery was In Direct Support of an infantry battalion. The BC's party was collocated with Battalion Headquarters to provide artillery advice and coordinate fire support.

Thickish vegetation typically cloaked areas of operations and Forward Observation (FO) parties were attached to to infantry companies, navigating by compass bearing and paced distance, typically ordering missions by map grid references so deduced, and then adjusting fire by sound. Because battalions had four companies while the Battery possessed only three FO Parties, the Kiwis provided an FO Party on some occasions, and on others the LO's Party became an FO Party.

Asked to describe the gun positions occupied on these early operations, one Gunner responded, "We were by ourselves, no digging in other than weapon pits. Dozers were not invented then, and neither were fire support bases (FSB). We did piquets around the perimeter, and clearing and standing patrols. I can't remember claymore

mines or splintex. Nor can I remember wire, or close infantry support. We felt isolated, dead tired, and somewhat scared".



On two occasions when with the 173rd the Battery's support proved particularly decisive. On *Operation Hump* in War Zone D, Kiwi FO, Captain Bruce Murphy, was awarded the Military Cross for skilfully directing fire from the Battery to protect two platoons from A Company, 1RAR. It was on this operation that the Battery was exposed to the grim reality of war when American dead were temporarily evacuated to its gun position. It was also at this position that for the first and only time ammunition was delivered using parachute extraction of pallets from a cargo plane flying at low level (LOLEX).

The second and perhaps more critical occasion arose during *Operation Silver City*, again in War Zone D. When American guns ran low on ammunition, the Battery fired continuously for four hours assisting an American battalion to repulse VC assaults.



When the fighting ceased that battalion counted more than 265 enemy casualties within 100 metres of its position. Its commander wrote to Peter Tedder: "Thanks for saving our lives. I have never seen finer shooting".

While operating with the 173rd, Captain Ken Bade, a FO, shown on the right with John Long in the photo below, was killed in a booby trap explosion during Operation Crimp, and Gunners Dick Hall, Frank Gulyas, and Sandy Lloyd, along with Bombardier Charlie Elwell, were wounded in action. Gunner Tom Simpson, died from cerebral malaria. Lieutenant Gordon Pound contracted the same illness, and fortunately recovered after repatriation to Australia.



After working with 173rd Airborne
Brigade to secure the Nui Dat area for 1st
Australian Task Force (1ATF), at 1800hrs on 5
June 1966 105 joined 161 and 103 Batteries under command of 1st Field Regiment RAA and 1ATF.
Allocated a position on the perimeter of the Task
Force base, the Tigers repeated the construction of defences they had done at Bien Hoa.



An early operational task with 1ATF was to provide Direct Support to 5RAR for a cordon and search of Binh Ba. The Battery returned to its base location on 18 August, just before the fighting at Long Tan commenced, during which the regiment fired almost constantly for three hours at high rates of fire in gathering darkness, driving rain, and clouds of propellant fumes.



The GPO, Lieutenant John Jansen, kept the gun line aware of the tactical situation as the Gunners maintained accuracy of lay despite the conditions, fogged up sights, and fatigue. As the BK, Bruce Stark, recalled, "it was all hands to the pumps serving the guns and unboxing ammunition. Everyone was flat chat. I even had the cooks, the LAD and the 131 Battery detachment involved."

In quieter times during the tour, entertainers such as Bob Hope, Lucky Starr and Pat Wordsworth - the 'Big Pretzel' - helped the Tigers forget the conflict for a while.



The Battery left Vietnam on 24 September 1966 having fired approximately 30,000 rounds. It could be justly proud of its achievements, but disappointingly the Government disallowed acceptance by the 1RAR Group of the United States Meritorious Unit Commendation for outstanding service with 173rd Airborne Brigade, and the South Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Palm Unit Commendation. It would take until 1991 and 2015 respectively for these decisions to be overturned However, during the tour Sergeant L W (Stretch) Fanning was awarded the US Army Commendation Medal for Meritorious Service; and Gunner Tom Simpson (posthumously) the South Vietnamese Armed Forces Honour Medal.



Graeme Maughan passed away
in Brisbane on 9 June 2025,
survived by his wife Isobel, his
two children, and their families
Graeme was born in
Warwick, Queensland, and

completed secondary school in Brisbane. When he graduated from OCS Portsea in June 1963 he "wanted to fly Army aircraft and decided the Artillery was the best Regiment from which to launch"

He joined 105th battery in Vietnam after Gordon Pound contracted cerebral malaria, deferring flying training to take up the posting.

Afterwards, Graeme spent 17 years with Army Aviation. As a flying instructor he was awarded a Queens Commendation for Valuable Service in the Air by the RAAF for his service at Point Cook in1969/70. He was later one of the few Army Aviators to be awarded the the RAAF Air Force Cross, in his case for the enviable flying safety record of

the School of Army Aviation while under his command.

Graeme left the Army in 1984 and joined the Department of Aviation as an Examiner of Airmen in Adelaide, a stepping stone to his selection as Aviation Manager and Chief Pilot with the Royal Flying Doctor Service. Back in Australia, he initially joined 8th Medium Regiment before spending the remainder of his military career



EXTENSION OF THE RAA NATIONAL MEMORIAL

The RAA National Memorial stands atop Mt Pleasant in Canberra, overlooking on one side Defence Headquarters and the parliamentary triangle, and on the other the Royal Military College, Duntroon. Plaques on the walls of the Memorial, which was constructed five decades ago, commemorate service in conflict between 1885 and Vietnam, but not in more recent times. Nor is there provision for the future.

The extension of the Memorial's walls aims to rectify the situation in keeping with the original design and provide a place of connection, reflection and commemoration for all Gunners, as well as their families, friends and members of the public".
